Special honorees Hannie Anderson and Tay Perry

The Annual Ala Wai Challenge will hold its 25th Anniversary on Sunday, January 24, 2010, from 8 A.M. to 1 P.M. at the Ala Wai Neighborhood Park. The Ala Wai Challenge is a fun filled community event for Hawai'i residents and visitors featuring outrigger canoe racing and ancient Hawaiian Makahiki games. This cultural event showcases how the Hawaiian people competed in these unique sport games that can only be found in Hawai'i.

Each year the event honors two living water sports legends of Hawai'i. The 2010 honorees are Hannie Anderson and Tay Perry. Hannie is one of the founders and race director of Na Wāhine O Ke Kai, race commissioner, Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association, and past president of OHCRA. Tay is a master builder and restorer of koa canoes, paddled 44 Molokai Hoe, and VP of Friends of Hōkūle'a and Hawai'iloa. Both are legendary canoe paddlers, and have perpetuated the legacy of native Hawaiian canoe racing in the community.

The Ala Wai Challenge is made possible through generous community support and presenting sponsor Hawaiian Electric Company. Two co-ed teams comprised of employees from across the company are practicing to compete in this years challenge and top their second place category win from last year. In addition to the canoe races, the event also features a variety of handmade Hawaiian crafts, free entertainment, food vendors, fun activities to learn how to create a green and sustainable community and the traditional hand pounding poi. Participants can also make their own smoothies by peddling a bicycle powered blender, also Friends of Hōkūleʻa and Hawaiʻiloa will demonstrate building an outrigger canoe (hands-on). Children can make and participate in ancient Hawaiian land games while you can experience authentic Lomi lomi (Hawaiian massage). Admission to the event is free for residents and visitors.

The outrigger canoe race is a mile race along the Ala Wai Canal, which is open to all skill levels. The race is a double elimination, having winners and consolation brackets so all teams race twice.

The Hawaiian games feature the 'ulu maika (bowling a round stone through pegs), 'ō'ō ihe (spear throwing), moa pahee (dart sliding), pōhaku hooikaika (stone throw) and huki kaula (tug of war). This is one of the few events on O'ahu where you can experience the ancient sports of Hawaiian culture known as Makahiki.

The event kick offs with a double-hulled canoe procession, in oli (chant) and Kahiko (ancient hula and song) by Hula Halau Ka Liko O Ka Palai and Kumu Hula Ainsley Halemanu.
