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Return to Waikīkī featuring slack key virtuoso Makana

Master slack key guitarist Makana opens a new show at the International Marketplace. *Return to Waikīkī – A Lū'au and Cocktail Show* showcases traditional and contemporary Hawaiian entertainment in a sophisticated production that will pay tribute to Waikīkī's past and present. Just steps from most hotels, this lū'au set under the canopies of banyan and palms trees in the heart of Waikīkī will take guests back to the spirit of the grand lū'aus and entertainments of the 1940s and 1950s.

"*Return to Waikīkī* celebrates the incredible story of how Hawaiian music came to be, from its pre-Western contact roots of Hula Kahiko to the Hawaiian music renaissance of the 1970s and beyond," says Makana. "I've created a musical presentation that combines masterful musicianship mixed with comedy, theatrics, dance and storytelling to entertain, inspire and enlighten visitors and residents to this rarely told tale."



The *Return to Waikīkī* outdoor facility is located in the center of the International Marketplace and sits 340 people for a dinner buffet show from 6:00 p.m. to 8:15 p.m. every Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Dinner and show tickets range from \$95 to \$125 per person. Children 4 to 11 are \$55 and children 3 and under are free.

In addition, Makana will be performing a cocktail show following the lū'au each night from 8:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. where many Hawaiian entertainers from other shows may stop by to jam the night away. No cover and two drink minimum.

Return to Waikīkī is the recreation of a time when Waikīkī was the world's darling, romantic and irresistible. Within this "timeless" setting our show takes place, and in the show we convey the incredible story of how Hawaiian music came to be what it is today, from its roots in oli (chant), through the influences of the missionaries, the Victorian era, the European bandmasters, the Kalakaua era and the popularization of stringed instruments, the hapa ha'ole era, the 50s & 60s, the Hawaiian Renaissance of the 1970s, up through our present interpretations of tradition. We celebrate this rarely told tale through music, hula & other forms of dance, theatre, comedy, and old film, in a "vaudeville" style performance that harkens to the golden era of radio and theatre. The world looks at Waikīkī through pictures, sounds and stories, and comes here to experience that place: they will find it when they happen upon our show. We created an experience that we wanted for ourselves- to re-live the magic of old Waikīkī, through the music and dance of Hawai'i.



The cast includes steel guitarist Buck Giles; Maunalua founding member, Lono Kaumeheiwā; drummer and percussionist Richard Marquez; upright bassist and vocalist, George Lopez; pianist, Jace Saplan; hula legend, Auntie Florence Iwalani Koanui; and dancer Pua La'a.

Kaulani Heritage Room

A MUST-SEE AT ROYAL HAWAIIAN CENTER

In *‘ōlelo Hawai‘i* (Hawaiian language), Kaulani means chiefly support and refers to the reciprocal relationship between the *ali‘i* (nobility) and the *maka‘āinana* (citizenry).

A glow with colorful lights and alive with Hawaiian history-themed short films, the Kaulani Heritage Room at Royal Hawaiian Center is not a typical shopping center amenity. The modest mini theatre in The Royal Grove welcomes all to soak in a plethora of information and fascinating stories on Hawaiian history, mythology and contemporary issues.

Each lasting approximately seven minutes, the Hawaiian-produced films are *Hanohano Helumoa* telling the story of this land section of Waikīkī named for a supernatural rooster; *I Mua Kamehameha* recounting the story of Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop and her lasting legacy, Kamehameha Schools; and *Hawai‘i Mau a Mau* celebrating the vibrancy of Native Hawaiians today.

Films are in Hi Def and were produced by Vince Keala Lucero of Co Creative Studios with the guidance and expertise of Randie K. Fong, Ho‘okahua cultural director at Kamehameha Schools. A mural by celebrated artist Solomon Enos is prominently featured depicting the journey of generations of Hawaiians.

Feather *kāhili* or royal standards are displayed in honor of Princess Pauahi who inherited the Helumoa coconut grove at Waikīkī from her Kamehameha ‘ohana (family). Flooring is of the native ‘ōhi‘a lehua wood – a revered forest plant that grows throughout The Royal Grove’s ethno botanical gardens surrounding the ‘Āpuakēhau water feature. Near the escalators and behind Coconut Hut Lei Stand are *pūhala* or pandanus trees that provide *lau* (leaves) for the weaving of the *moena lau hala* on the floor.

Interludes between the three films present scores of archival images from Bishop Museum, the spectacular memorial to Princess Pauahi located at Kaiwi‘ula in the Kalihi district of Honolulu.

In one of the captioned slide show interludes, images introduce the *mō‘ī* (monarchs) of the Hawaiian kingdom and members of the Kamehameha and Kalākaua dynasties. Another features gorgeous heirlooms including feather lei, cloaks and *kāhili*; polished wooden calabashes; the crown of King Kalākaua; and the famous gold and black enamel bracelet of Queen Lili‘uokalani, prototype of the hugely popular Hawaiian heirloom jewelry upon which names and phrases are inscribed.

The Kaulani Heritage Room is open daily from 10 am -10 pm. Across the corridor is Lei ‘Olu Guest Services named for the adorning flower lei, a symbol of Hawaiian hospitality. Our staff will assist you with shopping information, restaurant menus and activity schedules.
