New Elephant Exhibit for Honolulu Zoo

Acting Mayor Kirk W. Caldwell and City officials broke ground last Friday for the Honolulu Zoo's Asian elephant tropical forest exhibit.

Acting Mayor Caldwell said, "This will be a terrific new attraction, creating a spacious, natural environment for our elephants and a larger viewing area for zoo visitors. It joins a long list of improvements the City has made to the zoo, which have included the Keiki Zoo, orangutan exhibit, learning center, veterinary clinic, the new entrance now under construction, and more—all to make this a must-see for residents and visitors alike.

"With an average of 600,000 visitors a year, the Honolulu Zoo continues to be one of our top attractions and a

source of great pride for the City and County of Honolulu."

This is the second phase of a two-phase project. It includes the installation of 8-foot tall steel post and cable barriers; two exhibit areas each with a 55,000-gallon pool and 9-foot tall planters for shade trees; a pool water filtration system with lift stations and sedimentation basin; relocation of existing trees and planting of more than 30 new trees; three hydraulic gates; new concrete walkways; 4-foot tall chain link fence; landscaping; irrigation; grading; and rock work.

The first phase consisted of the construction of a holding facility located at the back of the exhibit area. The holding facility was completed in February 2007 and included a 7,260-square-foot reinforced concrete building to house cow and bull elephants.



An elephant restraining device to allow the safe examination of the animals was incorporated into the building, as were sewers and utilities.

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
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The new exhibit will have 1.4 acres of viewing area, which does not include the holding facility.

The cost is \$6.35 million and will take about a year to complete once construction begins this September.

The contractor is Watts Constructors, the consultant is SSFM International, and the construction manager is Limitaco Consulting Group.

with giveaways and special guest appearances at 7:30 p.m., with the movie showing at 8:00 p.m. (Seating first come, first served; no outside food, drink, or chairs allowed.)

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Revered worldwide as the "Father of International Surfing," Duke Kahanamoku is considered Hawai'i's greatest athlete, winning six Olympic medals -- including three gold medals in swimming -- over a 20-year career from 1912 to 1932. He was the first person to be inducted into both the Swimming Hall of Fame (1965) and the Surfing Hall of Fame (1966).

- Design, (learning how to attract a viewers eye into a painting and how to keep it there
- Value (light to dark, how to build a dramatic painting using lighting as a tool, pretending you're a lighting director on a movie set)
- Color, how to get infinite colors from just 5 colors (primaries plus neutrals/grays)
- Drawing, learn how to look at objects as shapes and how to use negative shapes to sharpen your design.

Student artist needs to decide what medium you want to paint in, watercolor /oil/acrylic. Mark recommends oils, but will accept others who paint in watercolor or acrylic. Whatever it is, you will use the same vocabulary of design, value, color and drawing.

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
